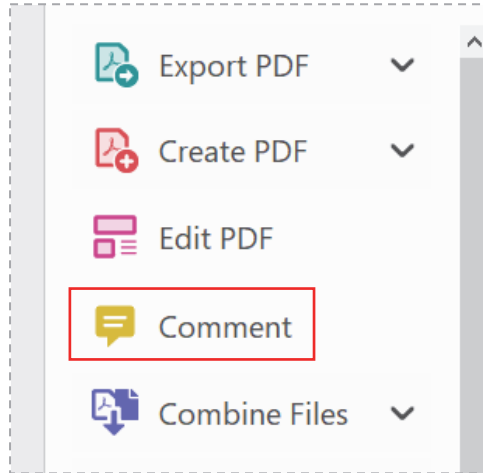


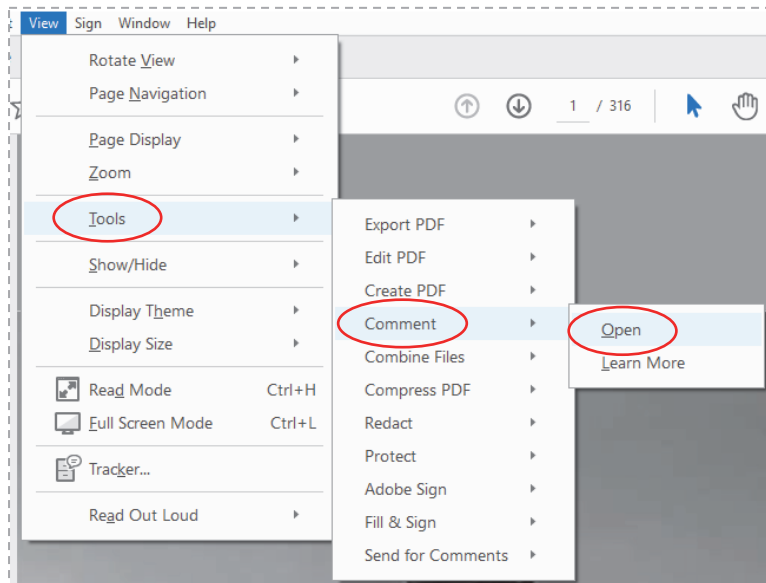


Commenting on PDF documents

In Adobe Acrobat or Acrobat Reader, find the **Comment** tool. Normally this tool is accessible from the right tool pane. Depending upon your version of the program the screen captures shown here may be slightly different than what appears on your computer screen.



Alternatively, you can click on the View drop-down menu, then **Tools**, then **Comment**, then **Open**.

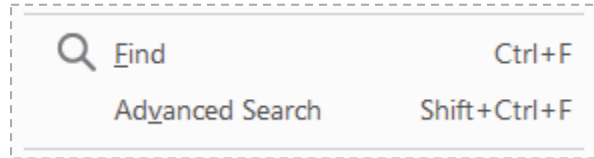


Whether you click on the word Comment in the side bar or access it through the drop-down menu this will open up the comment tool bar at the top of the page. We are primarily interested in the first 8 to 10 options.

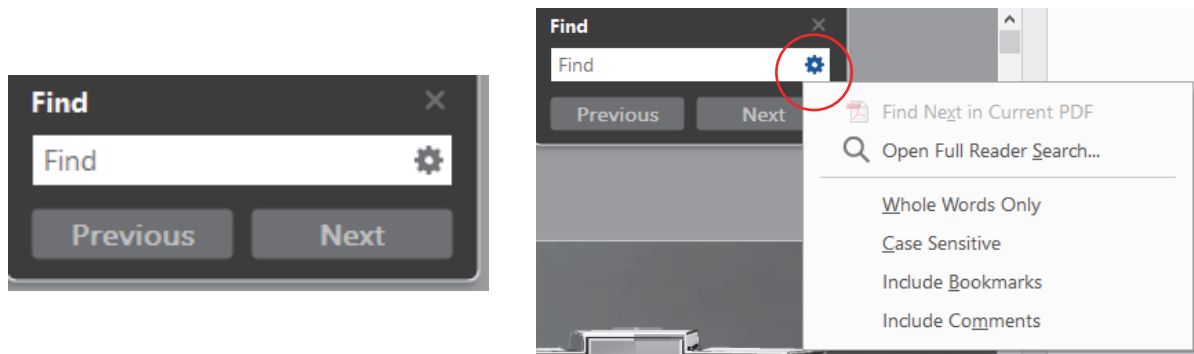




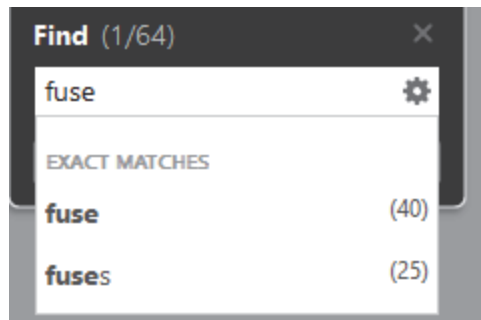
We are also interested in the search feature in the program. The search options can be accessed by clicking on the Edit drop-down menu or using the keyboard shortcuts.



The most common search option is the Find command accessed by using the keyboard shortcut of Ctrl+F. That brings up a search box where you can type the word or combination of words you are looking for. Clicking on the gear on the right side of the search box brings up other search options.



For example, if I wanted to look in an owner's manual for the section on fuses I would type the word Fuse into the search box.



Click next below the search box or use the enter key on your keyboard until you locate the section of interest in the PDF document. In this example I can see the section on fuses starts on page 232. Now I can navigate to page 232 to locate the specific fuse information I am after.

In this particular example the airbag control module fuse happens to be in the instrument panel fuse block. I want to highlight the fuses of interest and then I can save the document or print out the applicable pages. The highlighter tool is the second option from the left. It allows you to highlight text like using a highlighter on a piece of paper. When it is active the highlighter will display the selected color. The color options are selected towards the right side of the comment bar. Once you have the highlighter selected bring your mouse cursor to the area you want to highlight. Left click & hold the mouse button down, drag the cursor until you have highlighted what you want, and then let go of the mouse button.



The highlighting and commenting tools are also useful for taking notes in the PDF version of your class presentation. In this example I have highlighted important text on a slide and added a note.

“Normal” methods of retrieval

- First choice, through the DLC**
 - In the vehicle through the DLC
- Next choice, direct to the module while...**
 - “In car” - module remains bolted into the car and some wiring in place
 - When necessary, the module may also be removed from the vehicle and accessed directly on the “bench” or “desktop”
- We are “supposed” to get the same data regardless of retrieval method!**

You can also add comments to a slide without highlighting. That is done by using the Sticky Note option which is the far-left option just to the left of the highlighter tool. Click on the sticky note icon and then click on the PDF document where you want to place the note. Once you click on the screen you can then type the note. The icon can be moved around the screen. When you place your cursor over the icon the note appears as shown below.



Adapters & power

- CAN + Only
- ACM & PCM adapters
- D2M access only
- Power required
- Power into the adapter
- Not the CDR Tool

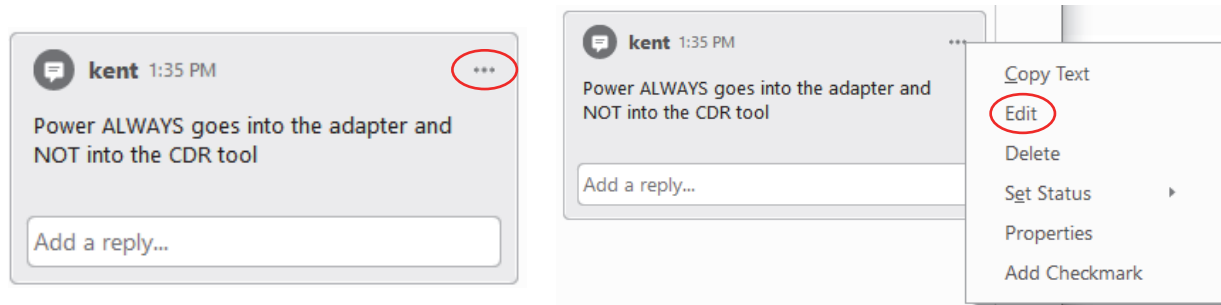

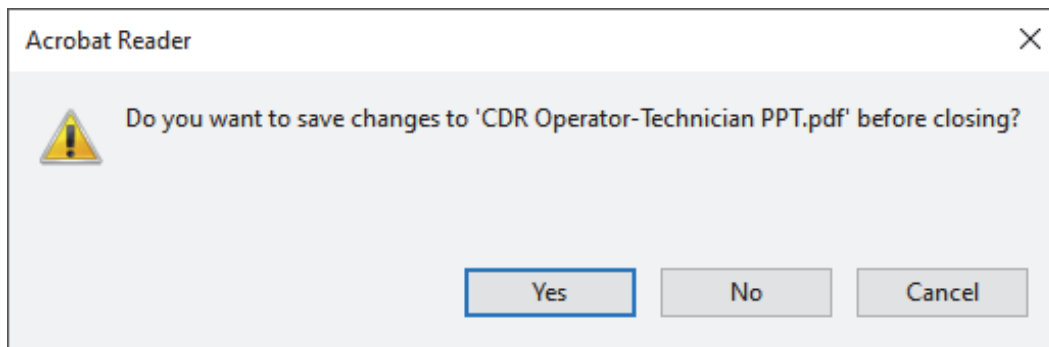
The 1st and best choice for data collection is through the DLC.



You can edit your comments by clicking on the comment. Then click on the three dots on the right upper corner of the comment. Finally click on Edit and modify and/or add to your comment as needed.



When you close out of the PDF document it will ask you if you want to save changes.



The recommendation is to save the document with a different name.
